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MINUTES AUGUST 20, 2024 6:00 p.m.

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CALL TO ORDER: President Washington called the August 20, 2024, meeting to order at 6:00 p.m. in Council Chambers, 101 S. George St., York, PA, with the following members present: Elizabeth Bupp, Teresa Johnescu, Felicia Dennis, and Edquina Washington, President, with President Washington presiding. Betsy Buckingham, Vice President, telephoned into the meeting.

Members of the Administration included: Kim Robertson, Business Administrator; India Banks, Interim Director of Public Works; Dave Rudolph, Interim Director of Public Works; Tom Landis, Lettice Brown, MS4 Coordinator; Joe Jefcoat, Treasurer; and Brett Flower, Assistant Solicitor.

I. Public Comment:

Marilyn Hake, resident, said she lives in the city and walks a lot and that she loves walking but it's getting worse every day with the eBikes and eScooters on the sidewalks. She said when she pulled out of the King St. garage someone flew down the sidewalk with an eBike and she almost hit him. She said the eBikes and eScooters are going faster than cars. She said someone is going to get hurt and something needs to be done.

Ashley Hill, resident, requested that police be held accountable for their insensitivities and asked that City Council investigate the misgivings of police officers.

There being no further comment, the public comment session adjourned at 6:11 p.m.

Final Passage of Bill No. 23, Session 2024, A Bill On motion of Bupp, seconded by Washington, Bill No. 23 amending Article 1763 "Property Maintenance Code" to include furniture not specifically and professionally manufactured for outdoor use as the type and category prohibited from the front yards of exterior property areas in the city, which was introduced by Bupp at the July 16 meeting and read by short title, came up for discussion. On motion of Bupp, seconded by Dennis, Bill No. 23 came up for discussion.

Councilwoman Bupp briefly outlined the intent of the bill.

Manuel Gomez, resident, said the compelling argument for this ordinance is that safety is omitted. He said there is no mention of combustibility or flammability of furniture anywhere in this ordinance. Additionally, he said someone may craft or construct their own furniture and he questioned if this too will be banned. He said this sounds like we're turning the city into an HOA. He said this legislation is only for vanity and aesthetic reasons.

Councilwoman Bupp said she is the chair of the Rules and Administrative Code committee and as such, it is her responsibility to introduce this legislation. She too questioned the omission of safety concerns.

President Washington read the definition of furniture (Section 302.13) for clarification.

Mr. Gomez said the ordinance is ambiguous and questioned how an inspector is supposed to determine what's professionally made. He said the ordinance should be more specific.

Councilwoman Bupp said the question is how we can make it more specific.

There being no further discussion, Bill No. 23 FAILED by the following vote: Yeas - Dennis, Buckingham - 2; Nays - Bupp, Johnescu, Washington - 3.

Administrator Robertson said this is a maintenance item to make sure we update our budget. Housing, CDBG and HOME funds are complicated because we have to identify the year the award was given. There is some delay in knowing what our award is and then actually getting the money and then auditing to see what money is actually left.

Administrator Robertson said this is for the summer parks program. We were getting sponsorship money from Highmark, and we needed to add it to the budget so we can spend it.

Joe Musso, applicant, said this includes two parcels of land that was owned by the RDA. There is a large 3-bay industrial building that is on another lot, and they'd like to put them on the same plot so they can be developed.

Councilwoman Bupp asked about the monuments and markers.

Musso said new pins are put in at the corner and the perimeter markers are not being changed at all. It's for surveying purposes.

Councilwoman Bupp asked if this is the Steve Buffington that works for the city. Mr. Musso said, no.

Resolution No. 73, Session 2024, A Resolution accepting the recommendations of HARB in

denying a certificate of appropriateness for work to be done at 244-252 N. George St., was Introduced by Buckingham, read at length, and on motion made by Washington, seconded Buckingham, Resolution No. 73 came up for discussion.

Councilwoman Johnescu said Mr. Bauer sent Council a thorough explanation of their request and an engineering report and site markups. She said HARB is tasked with reviewing any changes to historic properties in Historic Districts. There is subject matter expertise, and they make recommendations to Council and Council either approves or hears an appeal. She read the comp plan, and it is noted the importance of preserving our historic architecture. She outlined the contents of HARB's agenda relating to this case and said the information was inadequate.

Dennis Kunkle, HARB Chairman, said this is the second time they denied this application because of the old property on the lot. They were going to save it in the past and demolish some of the houses and now they are asking to demolish all the properties.

Councilwoman Johnescu said in February, Council approved a consolidation of parcels to make investment attractive and demolition wasn't on the table then and now they are saying the building is a total loss. She said although she understands unforeseen problems, the issue is to find a timely redevelopment opportunity for the property. If we allow the demolition of all these properties, how many more will we destroy. She said she is not comfortable setting precedent.

Councilwoman Bupp said she received an email from former Council President Henry Nixon in support of overturning HARB's recommendations. She said the owner is promising to save the bay windows and a few other features in those properties if they can demolish the properties.

Dylan Bauer, President, CEO, Royal Square Development, said he sympathizes with Councilwoman Johnescu's concerns. He said these structures are very dilapidated, but he doesn't want to set a precedent. We secured every bit of financing available, and we are still short in fixing them to today's code requirements. He outlined some of their restrictions with redevelopment including utilities. He said we are stuck, and our intent is to make way for a gateway park. We'll continue to pay taxes and maintain it. We are one of the only privately owned parks downtown. We want to prepare this for future development. He said he feels that a larger development is eminent.

Manuel Gomez, resident, said to consider the source as Royal Square has leverage and the historic appeal. He said the minutes are vague and there is no subject matter expertise. He said he doesn't feel this would set a precedent. He said it seems like HARB just said we'll deny it and see what Council does.

There being no further discussion, Resolution No. 73 FAILED by the following vote: Yeas – Johnescu – 1; Nays – Bupp, Dennis, Buckingham, Washington – 4. As Council denied the recommendations of HARB, the applicant is authorized to do work in accordance with the application submitted to HARB.

Sarah O'Brien, Director, Downtown Inc. said Jason Phillips couldn't attend and they appreciate Council's consideration of these appointments. She said follow them on social media at Downtown York PA. She explained what Downtown Inc does.

There being no further discussion, Resolution No. 75 PASSED by the following vote: Yeas -Bupp, Johnescu, Dennis, Buckingham, Washington - 5; Nays - 0. City Clerk Thompson administered Jason Sabol the oath of office.

President Washington thanked our board members for their service and asked that anyone interested in serving on a city board to visit the city's website or contact our city clerk.

Tom Landis, Parks Superintendent, said this is one of the most essential ground tools for those in charge of maintenance of recreational areas. He explained its purpose and uses. He said this will allow us to take care of our 25 parks with one person in a timely and efficient manner. He said he feels this will be a cost savings to the city and will beautify our city.

Councilwoman Bupp asked if it comes with a trailer. Mr. Landis said it can be trailered but this package has a light system that will allows us to use it on the road.

Dave Rudolph, Acting Public Works Director, said this is for transmission work on our Vactor Truck which we use to clean our sewer pipes. We are currently renting one for \$6,500 a week so we only rent it when we need it. With this transfer we'll be able to get our truck back on the road.

Manuel Gomez, resident, said we need a global surveillance policy. Your basic camera today is not the same came as five years ago, so we need to do this in a way that the community is partnering with you.

For the additional impediments for the affordable fair housing study as recommended by HUD, is \$30,000 for other professional services to get that study done.

Assistant Solicitor Flower said these are retroactive taxes and all three tax exoneration requests on tonight's agenda have been granted tax exempt status. For the Children's Aid Society, this starts in 2025. They are a purely public charity, and the exemption has to be applied consistently.

Councilwoman Johnescu said we still need a policy to evaluate these. Until we have a policy in place we don't have a choice. She said this leaves us in a bind and she's not comfortable voting when we don't have a policy in place.

Eric Chase, President, CEO, Children's Aid Society, said they assumed all the assets in January, and they immediately filed the appeal with the County and the County's exoneration was forwarded to the city.

Treasurer Jefcoat said interest is charged by the county not by the city. He said he doesn't know if we can take away all the interest and exonerate them.

Assistant Solicitor Flower said the underlying debt is forgiven.

City Clerk Thompson said this information was taken from the county's website which lists the amounts separately for county, school and city, so the amounts listed in the resolution are the city's fees.

Adrian Boxley, Founder and Pastor of Jabez Ministries said we were founded in 2016, and we have been a non-stop church entity since 2016. He said outside of church things, they have weekly drug & alcohol meetings, marriage counseling, food banks, feed the homeless events, cloth the homeless events, family cookouts for the homeless, men and women empowerment groups, youth and senior activities, MJ twirlers that practice before parades, and we partner with York City's GVI. In July 2023, we received a note on the door that we had to pay taxes. We had no clue we had to pay taxes. He said he immediately went to the county and school district to request exoneration. He said the county exonerated their taxes, and he was under the assumption that all taxes were exonerated. However, he said, somewhere along the line, no one told us we weren't exempt from York City until two weeks ago while he was teaching bible study, someone showed him a posting that was on the door. He said he's here today to implore Council to consider their commitment to our city. He said as a judge, community leader and pastor, he understands Councilwoman Johnescu's thought process, but they have always been a church and 501(c)3 entity. He said we took care of all the bills until this came up. He wants to continue working for his community.

There being no further discussion, Resolution No. 83 PASSED by the following vote: Yeas -Bupp, Dennis, Buckingham, Washington - 4; Nays - Johnescu - 1
